Fourth Quarter 2019

The Board officers for the 2020 are as follows: **Dan Campos** – president, **Ron Amstutz**, – vice-president, **Rusty Silverman** – secretary, and **Warren Meehan** – treasurer. Be sure to thank these gentlemen for all that they do for the VGA.

The Board voted to bring back the desert rule to be used in addition to Rule E-5.

The VGA desert rule is applied as follows;

- 1. In order for the Desert Rule to apply, the ball must pass over grass and remain inbounds. The player then may drop the ball in the grass, within two club lengths of the point where it entered the desert, no closer to the hole. The player is then assessed a one-stroke penalty. The ball does not have to be found in order to use the rule. However, the foursome must rule that the ball in not out-of-bounds.
- 2. If a player decides to play the ball out of the desert, and after completing the stroke the ball remains in the desert without crossing grass, he forfeits his use of the desert rule and must continue to play the ball in the desert. He may do so by playing the shot where the ball lies or by taking an unplayable lie for a one-stroke penalty. In taking an unplayable lie, the ball is placed within two club lengths of where the ball came to rest, but no closer to the hole.
- If the ball enters the desert at one point and is found closer to the hole, the ball is not to be dropped from a point opposite where it is found, but at the point of entry.

Rule E-5 is applied as follows:

- 1. Determine the ball reference point at which the ball went out-of-bounds or was lost, but not in a penalty area.
- 2. Sight a line from the pin though the ball reference point.
- 3. Determine the fairway reference point that is directly across from the ball reference point, but no closer to the hole.
- 4. Sight a line from the pin through the fairway reference point.
- 5. The relief area is the area between the two lines within a two-club lengths, but no closer to the hole and in the field of play.
- 6. Assess a two-stroke penalty.

If the ball is found, the rule cannot be used. Also, once a player decides to use the Rule E-5 and drops the ball according to the rule, that ball is in play and the lost ball, if found afterwards, is abandoned.

If you play a provisional ball, you cannot use the rule. However, you may use the rule on the provisional ball.

Also,. you may not use the rule if you are reasonably sure the ball is in a penalty area.

The Board **rescinded The Putter Ball Rule** in favor of using the same ball for putting that is hit to the green except if the ball is deemed damaged according to the rules of golf.

The Board is considering changing the minimum requirement for selecting the tees to be played from the 6,000 yard rule for men and the 5,000 yard rule for women to a system that uses the slope rating of the tees for individual courses.

The Champion of Champions tournaments are set for Wednesday February 5 at Orange Tree and Saturday February 8 at San Marcos. Any member that has won a tournament (only the lowest net score) between November 1, 2018 and October 31, 2019 is eligible for the respective day. There is a \$10 entry fee for each tournament which will be paid out to the players with the best net scores.. Golfers who have won an event on both Wednesday and Saturday may enter both tournaments.

Letters to Arnie

Dear Arnie,

I hit a ball that landed in an area with tall grass and bushes. I saw what I thought was my ball and hit it out into the open when I realized that it was not my ball. Another player in my foursome told me that I incurred a two-stroke penalty for hitting a wrong ball. I claimed that I did not purposely hit a wrong ball and therefore should not receive the penalty. Who was correct? Wackin' Warren

Dear Warren.

USGA Rule 6.3c states "You must not make a stoke at a wrong ball" (this includes if you miss it). It is a general penalty and, the other player was correct, it is a two-stroke penalty. The rule goes on to say that "In stroke play, you must correct the mistake by continuing play with the original ball by playing it as it lies or taking relief under the Rules:". "The stroke made with the wrong ball and any strokes before the mistake is corrected do not count." The rule further states that you must correct your mistake before making a stroke on the next hole (meaning the hole you are currently playing) or before returning your scorecard after the eighteenth hole. The penalty for failing to do so, is disqualification.

Now, what happens if you intentionally hit a wrong ball while you have a ball in play? I would consider this practicing. USGA 5.5 states "While playing a hole and between two holes, you must not make a practice stroke (swing at a wrong ball)." It is a general penalty, two-stokes, and the penalty is to be assessed on the next hole. You may take practice swings, but not practice strokes.
