Al Dan scored a hole-in-one at Desert Canyon's 174 yard par three thirteenth hole on July 8. He hit his six-iron to the back of the elevated green not knowing he aced it until he found the ball in the hole. It was his first hole-in-one. Great shot Al.

Dan Chistiansen scored his first hole-in-one on the **115 yard hole number seven at Las Sendas**. He used his **nine-iron** to hit his perfect shot. He thought ball was close, but not in the hole because it was still visible due to the COVID-19 collar. **Way to go Dan!**

With the two above holes-in-one, that makes five holes-in-one for the VGA from April **1 through August 1** and each of these golfers scored their first aces of their life.

Big Dog Bites

Standings through October 10.

Letters to Arnie

Dear Arnie,

Recently, I hit a ball out-of-bounds near the green. How should I have applied Rule E-5

Dear Dan,

As when a ball is hit out-of-bounds or lost near the fairway, you should have picked out two reference points, one at spot A where the ball was hit out-of-bounds and the other at spot B on the edge of the fairway no closer to the hole. Then imagine two lines, one through the pin to spot A and the other through the pin to spot B on the edge of the fairway. The drop zone is beyond the arc drawn drawn between spot A and spot B. You must drop the ball so that it is no closer to the hole than the point where it went out-of-bounds. You would be assessed a two-stroke penalty.

Remember you may not use the Rule E-5 if;

The ball is likely to be in a penalty area. The ball is found in-bounds. You have hit a provisional shot.

However, you may use the rule on the provisional ball.

Dear Arnie,

Recently while my ball was lying in the rough, I accidentally kicked it so that it moved. I was surprised when one of players in my foursome told me I should get a one-stoke penalty and that I needed to put the ball back or get a two-stroke penalty. When I returned to club house, I asked someone in the pro shop, if I should have been penalized for kicking my ball and was told no. Who was correct? **Careless Carl**

Dear Carl,

Well, both rulings are correct in certain situations. Your playing partner was correct in your situation. If a player inadvertently moves a ball (beyond rocking back and forth) while not on the green, it is a one-stoke penalty and if the ball is not replaced, then it is a two-stroke penalty.

However there are **two new exceptions** to the rule instituted in 2019.

If a player inadvertently moves a ball **on the putting green**, he must replace it for no penalty.

If a player inadvertently **moves or strikes a ball when searching for it**, he will not be penalized as long as he replaces the ball.

You may remember in final round of the **Memorial Tournament** earlier tis year, **John Rahm** was assessed a two-stroke penalty for moving the ball slightly. You can see in the video that when he placed his club behind the ball in the rough, it rolled backwards.

Dear Arnie,

Unbelievably, within a few days, I saw the following happen twice. A player chipped a first ball towards the green when the ball struck a second ball in the fairway. Each time the second ball rolled onto the green. In each case the foursomes decided to replace

the second ball at the point where it was struck and to leave the first ball where it ended up. Were we correct in out ruling? **Nailin'** Neal

Dear Neal,

You and your foursomes made the correct ruling. USGA Rule 9.6 covers your situation. It states that "If it is known or virtually certain that an outside influence lifted or moved your ball there is no penalty. The ball must be replaced on its original spot (which if not known must be estimated)." Further, in your case, there is no penalty for the player who made the chip. However, if Player A putts from on the green and his ball strikes another ball on the green, Player will be assessed a two-stoke penalty and is to play the ball where it lies.
