#### News from the VGA Board

The Board voted to have Two-Man Best Ball tournaments for both Wednesday and Saturday events in each quarter for a total of eight per year. The VGA will sponsor \$200 for each tournament with the payout being as follows; first place \$100, second place \$60, and third place \$40. The tournament director will choose pairings either using handicaps or a blind draw. In a related matter, The Board voted to eliminate the Champion-of-Champions and The President's Cup events.

The Board voted to designate one board meeting per year to be known as the Annual Members Meeting. It will be scheduled in the fourth quarter with the expectation that all interested members may attend. The agenda will include; the nomination of board members, the nomination of board officers, and the annual awards presentation. A social hour will follow with snacks and drinks provided by the VGA.

**The Board** voted to make the **\$10 VGA entry mandatory**. Players will no longer be able to pay \$1, \$4, or \$7 to enter VGA tournaments with the **exception of VGA members with 25 or more years** of membership.

#### Highlights from the Fourth Quarter

#### Eagles

Fred Baldwin eagled the 274 yard par-four hole number 14 at Toka Sticks on February 1. He hit his driver through the fairway into the trees to left of the green. From about 75 yards, he punched a hot five-iron through the trees that bounced three times and then disappeared into the hole.

Bob Inman eagled the 441 yard par-five hole number five at Francisco Grande on February 11. "I had a beautiful drive of 220 yards down the middle. My second shot was a seven-wood and it ended up at the bottom of the hill below the green. My sand wedge was a nice shot, but I could not see it land as the green and the flag were above my head. One of the foursome said the shot bounced twice and then rolled into the cup for a great eagle." Outstanding hole Bob!

Steve Richter eagled the 287 yard par-four hole number four at Bear Creek on February 15. "I hit three-wood off the tee and the ball ended up in the fairway just right of the left hand bunker, however the ball settled into an old sanded divot. I had about 95 yards to the pin and used a pitching wedge making sure to hit down on the ball to get it out of the divot. The ball flew towards the flag, which was in the front, hit about eight feet short, rolled towards the hole and disappeared." Great shot Steve! Dan Campos eagled the 510 yard par-five hole number 16 at Cave Creek on February 18. !Bueno tiro El Presidente!

Rusty Silverman eagled the 488 yard par-five hole number 18 at Pueblo El Mirage on February 25. "There was a strong favoring wind that day. I hit the tee-ball left, but straight towards the mobile homes on my left. I thought it was out-of-bounds. Somehow, the ball cleared the trees and came to rest 165 yards from the flag. From there, I hit an eight-iron that landed just short of the green and began tracking towards the hole. George Kowalchik thought it went in for a two, but it must have lipped out and ended up on the edge of the cup for an eagle three." That is amazing Rusty!

Kevin Haskew eagled the 528 yard par-five hole number two at Pueblo El Mirage on March 18. "I hit my driver to the first cut and a four-iron to about 14 feet below the hole. I made the putt." Excellent hole, bloke!

# Letters to Arnie

## Dear Arnie,

While I was walking onto a green, I saw a player in my foursome hitting the ground with a club where there was a divot in the line between his ball in the fairway and the hole on the green. When I asked him what was he doing, he stated that **he was fixing a divot**. I informed him that what he was doing was against the rules and carried **a penalty of two strokes for fixing a divot in the line of play**. He immediately found the USGA rule and graciously accepted the penalty. **Fixin' Freddy** 

## Dear Freddy,

You were correct on two counts. First the **player had broken a rule** of golf and second, to **point out his mistake**. **USGA Rule 8.1a(3) prohibits improving conditions affecting the stroke** by pressing down, removing or repositioning a divot in a divot hole, which is **treated as part of the ground (and not as a loose impediment)** even if it is not yet attached or growing.

Of course, this rule does not apply to man-made imperfections on the green. A player may **fix ball marks, divots, or other imperfections on the green**.

It is incumbent of all players to be aware of any rule violations that may occur while playing in your foursome. A player must ask for an explanation if he feels another player has applied a rule incorrectly. Also, players must not agree to "forget" a rule violation. It is grossly unfair for one player to apply a penalty correctly while another player ignores a rule.

# Dear Arnie,

Recently a player **marked his ball on the green with an acorn**. Another player's putt in our foursome hit the acorn. Who, if any one, should have been penalized? **Annie Oaktree** 

#### Dear Annie,

The acorn is a loose impediment and not a ball-marker. The player who marked the ball with the acorn gets a one-stroke penalty for picking up a ball in play without marking it with a ball-marker - USGA Rule 14.1(a). The ball that struck the acorn is to be played as it lies - USGA Rule 11.1(a).

USGA Rule 14 establishes that a ball marked on the green must be marked with a "ballmarker" and defines a ball-marker as an artificial object used to mark the spot of a ball to be lifted, such as a tee, a coin, an object made to be a ball-marker or other small piece of equipment.
